OVERVIEW FORM FOR CLOSE FAMILY VISITS

(- This overview form is to be used for your convenience only -)

Third-country nationals are exempt from travel restrictions to Iceland during COVID-19, if they can demonstrate their close family connection to an Icelandic citizen, an EEA/EFTA citizen (incl. UK), a citizen of Andorra, Monaco, San Marino or the Vatican, or to a residence permit holder in those countries. The final decision to allow or deny entry into the country is made by border guards upon arrival.

An exemption from travel restrictions does **not** equal an exemption from screening and quarantine requirements – further information can be found on www.covid.is/en.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Spouse or cohabitating partner of Icelandic or other EEA/EFTA citizens (including the UK) or citizens of Andorra, Monaco, San Marino or the Vatican. <p>– Relatives are permitted to travel to Iceland with their children (considered minors) who have not reached the age of 18 on arrival to Iceland. The condition is set that the relative and the child are travelling together and can provide proof of familial relationship.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Confirmed documents to prove the citizenship of a spouse/cohabitant (e.g. copy of passport) who is to be visited in Iceland. Confirmation of the legal residency of a relative in Iceland (e.g. certificate from Registers Iceland). <u>Only the confirmation of the residency of either spouse/cohabitant is required if couples or cohabitants travel together to Iceland.</u> <p>AND</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Certified marriage certificate, OR Certified cohabitation certificate <p>AND (if travelling with own child under the age of 18)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Confirmation of family relationship (i.e. birth certificate). <p>OR (if in transit)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> If spouse or cohabitating partner are transiting through Iceland on their way to another Schengen country, then he/she must be able to provide proof of his/hers spouse's or cohabitating partner's nationality in the relevant state and that he/she is permitted to travel there as a family member and has proof thereof.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> A spouse or cohabitating partner of a residence permit holder in Iceland or any other EEA/EFTA state (including the UK) or Andorra, Monaco, San Marino or the Vatican. <p>– Relatives are permitted to travel to Iceland with their children (considered minors) who have not reached the age of 18 on arrival to Iceland. The condition is set that the relative and the child are travelling together and can provide proof of familial relationship.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Copy of a valid residency permit of a spouse/cohabitant that will be visited in Iceland. Confirmation of the legal residency of a relative in Iceland (e.g. certificate from Registers Iceland). <u>Only a valid residency permit of either spouse/cohabitant is required if couples or cohabitants travel together to Iceland.</u> <p>AND</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Certified marriage certificate, OR Certified cohabitation certificate.



	<p>AND (if travelling with own child under the age of 18)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Confirmation of family relationship (i.e. birth certificate). <p>OR (if in transit)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> If spouse or cohabitating partner are transiting through Iceland on their way to another Schengen country, then he/she must be able to provide proof of his/hers spouse's or cohabitating partner's nationality in the relevant state and that he/she is permitted to travel there as a family member and has proof thereof.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Other close relatives of Icelandic or other EEA/EFTA citizens (including the UK) or citizens of Andorra, Monaco, San Marino or the Vatican: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Child, stepchild, grandchild or step-grandchild of the person living in Iceland, his/her spouse or cohabitating partner. Parent, stepparent or step-grandparents of the person living in Iceland, his/her spouse or cohabitating partner Siblings or stepsiblings of the person living in Iceland, his/her spouse or cohabitating partner. <p>Relatives are permitted to travel to Iceland with their children (considered minors) who have not reached the age of 18 on arrival to Iceland. The condition is set that the guardian and the child are travelling together and can provide proof of familial relationship.</p> <p>Children (considered minors) who have not reached the age of 18 on arrival to Iceland and fulfill the entry conditions are permitted to travel to Iceland with a parent/legal guardian even though that individual is not eligible for exemptions to travel restrictions to Iceland. The condition is set that the child and the parent/legal guardian are travelling together and can provide proof of familial relationship.</p> <p>≠ Family members other than those specified above are not entitled to this exemption.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Confirmation of the citizenship of the family member to be visited in Iceland (e.g. copy of passport). Certified documents verifying familial ties to the guardian (e.g. birth certificate, marriage certificate, proof of guardianship) – also applies if travelling with own child under the age of 18 or if child who fulfills the entry conditions is travelling with parent/legal guardian who is otherwise not eligible for exemptions to travel restrictions. Confirmation of the legal residency of a relative in Iceland (e.g. certificate from Registers Iceland). Only documentation verifying the citizenship of a relative and familial ties need be submitted if the parties are travelling to Iceland together. OR (if in transit) If a relative is transiting through Iceland on his/her way to another Schengen country, then he/she must be able to provide proof of family member's nationality in the relevant state and that he/she is permitted to travel there as a family member and has proof thereof.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Other close relative of residence permit holders in Iceland or any other EEA/EFTA state (including the UK) or Andorra, Monaco, San Marino or the Vatican: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Children, stepchildren, grandchildren, step-grandchildren. Parents, stepparents, grandpa rents, step-grandparents. Siblings, step-siblings. <p>Relatives are permitted to travel to Iceland with their children (considered minors) who have not reached the age of 18 on arrival to Iceland. The condition is set that the guardian and the child are travelling together and can provide proof of familial relationship.</p> <p>Children (considered minors) who have not reached the age of 18 on arrival to Iceland and fulfill the entry conditions are permitted to travel to Iceland with a parent/legal guardian even though that individual is not eligible for exemptions to travel restrictions to Iceland. The condition is set that the child and the parent/legal guardian are travelling together and can provide proof of familial relationship.</p> <p>≠ Family members other than those specified above are not entitled to this exemption.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Copy of a valid residency permit of a relative that will be visited in Iceland Certified documents verifying familial ties to the family member (e.g. birth certificate, marriage certificate, proof of guardianship) – also applies if travelling with own child under the age of 18 or if child who fulfills the entry conditions is travelling with parent/legal guardian who is otherwise not eligible for exemptions to travel restrictions. Confirmation of the legal residency of a relative in Iceland (e.g. certificate from Registers Iceland). Only a valid residency permit of a relative and documentation of familial ties need be submitted if the parties are travelling to Iceland together. OR (if in transit) If a relative is transiting through Iceland on his/her way to another Schengen country, then he/she must be able to provide proof of family member's legal residence in the relevant state and that he/she is permitted to travel there as a family member and has proof thereof.
